Cases, documents, and notes on international law.

Digest of important public laws, history and personnel data of the Federal Administrative Agencies and the first session of the Seventy-fifth Congress.

How Lawyers Think. By Clarence Morris. Cambridge: Harvard University Press. 1937. Pp. xiv, 144. \$1.50.

Recognizing as one of the fundamental objects of legal education the development of skill in legal thinking, the author shows the part that logic, psychology, and jurisprudence play in this thought process.

Income Tax Fundamentals. By Frederick Leon Pearce. Chicago: The Foundation Press, Inc. 1937. Pp. xxiv, 581. \$5.00.

A lawyer and certified public accountant presents the fundamental structure of the Federal income tax, with emphasis on the tax structure rather than upon the detailed procedure of preparing the returns.

A factual report of the development and present status of government old-age pensions and benefits in foreign countries with a summary of existing plans in the United States; and a program for action, pointing out the weaknesses and inadequacies of the present American program and making concrete recommendations to remedy them.

The Social Security Act in Operation. By Birchard E. Wyatt and William H. Wandel. Washington: Graphic Arts Press, Inc. 1937. Pp. xiii, 382. \$3.50.

A practical guide to the Federal and Federal-State Social Security programs, explaining the Social Security Act, its purpose and practical operation, and setting forth what has been done to put it into effect and what are the problems of the future.
