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Domestic Problems" the application of miscegenation statutes where only one party to the marriage is domiciled in a state prohibiting interracial marriages or where the parties after marriage move for the first time into such a state, raises substantial questions of the conflict of laws. These questions are not discussed. The already mentioned constitutional problems of residential segregation are dismissed with statements to the effect that state action cannot impose residential segregation although such imposition through private covenants is legal (pp. 145, 147). Again, there is no mention of the problem of waiver which creates the one serious issue in the whole group of recent cases in which school teachers or other public employees challenge racial discrimination in the fixing of salaries. Such matters could profitably have been analyzed in space which the author devotes to extended comment upon unimportant cases. Thus, an interesting but relatively trivial controversy over the custody of white children by their colored stepfather so intrigues the author that he devotes two pages to its discussion.

In brief, the reviewer regrets that the author did not undertake a more ambitious task than the cyclopaedic presentation to which he restricted himself. At the same time the debt of the profession, and the interested layman as well, to the author for his careful and thorough compilation is substantial.

In its physical aspects this book maintains the high standards which readers have come to associate with the imprint of the University of the North Carolina Press.
