The United Nations Emergency Force. By Gabriella Rosner. New York: Columbia University Press, 1963. Pp. 294. \$6.75.

An analysis of the plans and efforts of the past to create an international military force and problems that arose consequent to its establishment, including its constitutional basis, legal status, and financial situation.

The Wagner Act Cases. By Richard C. Cortner. Knoxville: The University of Tennessee Press, 1964. Pp. 208. \$6.00.

An examination of the constitutional doctrines at issue, the role of the National Labor Relations Board in constitutional adjudication, and the maneuvering of interest groups involved in the struggle.

The New Commonwealth and Its Constitutions. By S. A. de Smith. London: Stevens & Sons, 1964. Pp. 312.

A description of the status of the commonwealth and its members, and the workings of its internal relations in international law. The author deals with Malaysia, the Nigerian Republic, some amendments of the Uganda constitution, and the basis content of the constitution for Kenya.

Treasury of Law. Edited by Richard W. Nice. New York: Philosophical Library, Inc., 1964. Pp. 553. \$10.00

The editor has assembled meaningful and significant documents that contributed to man's determination to govern his conduct in inter-personal and international affairs, and which reflect early attempts to establish some form of regulatory practice in dealing with specific problems of the times.

A symposium volume devoted to a ten-year look ahead in the federal tax field.
