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BOOKS RECENTLY RECEIVED

Criminal Justice in Our Time. By Yale Kamisar, Fred E. Inbau, and Thurman Arnold. Charlottesville, Va.: The University Press of Virginia. 1965. Pp. 165. \$1.75. (paperbound).

This book consists of three essays marking the 750th anniversary of Magna Carta. The essays focus upon the problem of adjusting the rights of the criminal accused and of society. The essays are entitled: "Equal Justice in the Gatehouse and Mansions of America"; "Law Enforcement, the Courts, and Individual Civil Liberties"; and "The Criminal Trial as a Symbol of Public Morality."

The Great Charter. By Samuel E. Thorne, William H. Dunham, Jr., Phillip B. Kurland, and Sir Ivor Jennings. New York: Pantheon Books. 1965. Pp. ix, 149. \$4.95.

This book consists of another series of essays commemorating the 750th anniversary of Magna Carta. The essays focus upon the meaning of Magna Carta at the time it was written, its influence on American law, its effect upon the development of English constitutional law through the eighteenth century, and the way in which Magna Carta's influence was transplanted to other cultures.

Legal Aspects of Arms Control Verification in The United States. By Dennis S. Aronowitz. Dobbs Ferry, N.Y.: Oceana Publications, Inc. 1965. Pp. 222. \$6.50.

This is a study under the auspices of the Legislative Drafting Research Fund, Columbia University. The book itself is a report on the legal implications of verification under an assumed arms control treaty.

The Petitioners. By Loren Miller. New York: Pantheon Books. 1965. Pp. ix, 433. \$8.95.

Written by a Negro judge, this book is an account of what the Supreme Court of the United States has done in respect to the rights of Negroes between 1789 and 1965.
