Volume 1 of this work contains a subchapter on foreign commerce. General principles governing jurisdiction and applicability of U.S. antitrust law and how the interests of foreign governments should be accommodated are treated.

W. FUGATE, FOREIGN COMMERCE AND THE ANTITRUST LAWS (2d ed. 1973).

A thorough review of the application of U.S. antitrust laws to international commerce.

J. GRIFFIN, PERSPECTIVES ON THE EXTRATERRITORIAL APPLICATION OF U.S. ANTITRUST AND OTHER LAWS (1979).

This book derives from two programs presented at the 1978 ABA meetings. The first part analyzes the extraterritorial impact of U.S. laws from the U.S., British and Canadian perspectives. The second part is an appraisal of the Antitrust Guide for International Operations.

E. KINTNER & M. JOELSON, AN INTERNATIONAL ANTITRUST PRIMER (1974).

While not a comprehensive treatment of international antitrust, it contains a broad survey of the major premises of antitrust law. Its focus on specific issues makes it useful to a general practitioner seeking a solid background.
